

There has been a positive change in the field of statutory health practices to avoid the outbreak of corona.

In this difficult situation, Kajla Janakalyan Samity has always stood by the backward people of the society.

Ignoring all obstacles, conflicts and problems for the last 78 years, the association has organized its 72nd Annual General Meeting this year with the goal of the overall development of the vulnerable people of the society by following optimistic thinking.

Kajla Janakalyan Samity is currently working on education, health, child protection, women empowerment, natural resource management and disaster management for the overall development of the poor, neglected, exploited people, especially children and women, in Purba Medinipur, Jhargram, Howrah and South 24 Parganas districts.

We are grateful and indebted to them.

We are proud to announce that the following remarkable achievements have been achieved in the current financial year due to the tireless work of our employees and well-wishers from all walks of life.

• In the current year, 3088 children have benefited directly and about 5000 children and parents have indirectly benefited from the education program.

- In South 24 Parganas district, a total of 200 students from class-VI to Class-IX are regularly taught according to the prescribed curriculum to increase the knowledge and skills of the students in mathematics and science by running a STEM learning centres.
- The 42 Adolescent Collective consisted of 1130 adolescents.
- In Purba Medinipur, Jhargram and South 24 Parganas districts, 78 child marriages have been stopped with the help of administration.
- In the current year, seven children have been awarded the "Veerangana" award for bravery by the West Bengal State Commission for Protection of Child Rights.
- Through proper management of natural resources through the initiative of 1650 farmers, biodiversity has been brought in the area and quality agricultural production in the area has increased by 10-12 percent.
- 265 hectares of cultivable land in the two districts is being cultivated organically.
- Worked directly with 19213 individuals to provide various health services, awareness raising and skill development and reached 298558 persons indirectly.
- 8105 women have joined the Income Initiative programme.
- 91% of the teams have created their emergency fund and 6595 women have benefited from its proper use.
- Food items, tarpaulin, hygiene kits and cooked food have been distributed to 86,050 people to 21,120 families affected by Yaas and coronavirus outbreak.
- Thermal guns, pulse oximeters and other health equipment and medicines have been provided and trained to 3,600 ASHA workers and ANMs to fight COVID-19.
- A Green Scout comprising 885 adolescents has been formed and trained in South 24 Parganas and Purba Medinipur districts on disaster management and climate change.
- Information and culture officers of South 24 Parganas and Jhargram districts have been roped in to take covid vaccines and raise public awareness about personal health habits.
- 10,000 mangrove saplings have been planted and 10 fruit gardens have been set up in Gopalnagar Gram Panchayat of Patharpratima block of South 24 Parganas district to prevent river dam erosion.

In the present year, many legendary people from home and abroad have died. We are also saddened by the passing away of those who lost their lives due to COVID-19. We are saddened by the passing away of our dear President Pashupati Nandi and former Treasurer Sunil Panda. I pray for the peace of their immortal souls and peace for their families.

We are also grateful and indebted to all the members, volunteers and staff of the Association for their dedication, honesty, responsibility, enthusiasm, initiative and skill.

Your constructive feedback on the annual report is always welcome.

- To take decisions democratically.


Strategies of the Organization

Introduction


The entire nation was prepared for Bharat Janani's freedom in 1945. Several well-intentioned locals "Milita Bandhab" formed themselves in Sarda village during the time of this freedom movement. A tiny club known as This club was constructed in a rural area for low-income individuals and cultural customs. It has worked tirelessly to provide healthcare and address several social issues. The "Milita Bandhav" club's name was then changed to "Kajla Janakalyan Samity," which was formally registered in 1956. The Atchala club, formed by the village's young people, is called "Gutiguti". Today's adventure began on foot in the districts of East Medinipur, Jhargram, South 24 Parganas, and Howrah. With the help of many programmes, it has been assisting people for 78 years.

Late Professor Sudhanshu Shekhar Panda, Late Radhashyam Panda, and Late Shivram Panda stand out among those who worked tirelessly to establish the organization. Late Phanibhushan Das and his associates stood next to the donated land. Service and welfare-focused for four decades since the start of time.

For instance, managing charitable medical facilities has benefited the populace; meanwhile, infrastructure development has also been carried out. In the villages, cooperative societies have developed under the association's supervision. Elementary and secondary schools, post offices, libraries, as well as roads and electricity have all been erected in the village. The phone is in service. After 1989–1990, the association for common, backward people became permanent. Development efforts have been made.

As a non-governmental organization, the group believes that the region needs some long-overdue development work. Time will help to change the way the government operates. Alternative Education Facilities, Alternative Farming Demonstration Sites, Ideal Women Self-sufficient groups, alternative food security methods, Shelters for the homeless that are oriented toward children, educational support facilities, Child Protection Committees, Farmer Producer Companies, Sabuj Bahini, Kishore Kishori Bahini, Child-Friendly Gram Panchayats, Mangrove Protection Committees, etc. Having assisted people for more than 70 years. To make them well-educated in a variety of areas, the association believes that alternative development ideas should be put into practice.

Kajla Janakalyan Samity is currently in charge of well-integrated development intending to promote human development as a whole. Government and corporate institutions gained familiarity and trust with intellectuals and regular people by maintaining the decentralization of authority.





Real education involves establishing human values; hence it depends on total excellence through a pleasant method to ensure that all kids receive an education.

SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE EDUCATION PROGRAMME THIS YEAR

- 3051 kids are in school because of the shutdown of the schools due to the covid pandemic.
- They were now attending conventional school since they had lost interest. 50 villages in all have access to Samiti-run educational institutions. Students have resumed classes.
- Via handwashing and educating 3000 families in East Medinipur, South 24 Parganas, and Howrah hotels about COVID through home visits, wearing masks, and washing hand habits are examples of hygiene practices.



Kajla Janakalyan Samity provides direct education to 3051 students in the current school year. A total of 5000 parents and children have indirectly benefited from the work of education programmes.

Own School:

Kajla seeks to raise the standard of education for kids and provide innovative teaching techniques.



The organization Janakalyan Samity has been operating for the past three decades. At the moment, it is being managed by the villagers and the organization, running 5 schools in the East Medinipur district. Within these, 4 schools are being utilized for pre-primary education to class IV and 1 primary school is being utilized for pre-primary to Higher Secondary level education. The students' number is 1009. To operate these schools, only 20% of financial adjuvant are donated by

the organization, and the rest of the expenses are managed by the villagers.

Education Support Centre:



The aim is to improve the educational teaching method and bring more children to the schools, of these families like Fisherman families, backward Tribal families, and minority families. The selected areas are Coastal Ramnagar-2 of east Medinipur District, Kanthi-1 and Deshpran block, in Jhargram district Nayagram and Gopivallabhpur Block No. -1 and Magrahat-2nd Block of South 24 Parganas District. With 1299 children, 29 education centers are running till now.

Bridge Course Centre:




During the school closing period, has arranged bridge curriculum centers for the socio-economic children of backward families. The selected areas are Gopalchak, North Harashchak, and South Harashchak villages. To increase the educational standard the continuously centers are developing themselves with the team. 240 students of these families are getting education.

Multi-Purpose Activity Centre:

With the help of "Save The Children", and with Kajla Janakalyan Samity's management 6 Joyful

education techniques have been made. The centers are located in Ramnagar-1 and 2, Deshpran and Contai-1 no. Block at East Midnapore. 540 students are directly enjoying these joyful learning centers. To make the school coming continuation more effective, interaction with parents and children is being followed. Child safety and environmental education is given by the centers as well.



STEM Learning Centre:

Kajla Janakalyan Samiti has been taking several initiatives for three decades to improve the quality of child education. The organization has started 2 STEM learning centers in Mohanpur village under Magrahat block no-2 at South 24 Pargana to create the importance of science and non-natural energy interest among students. The following subjects are Maths and science, and the students' numbers are 200.



Anima De Education Fund:

This fund was invented with the financial support of Dr. Arun Shekhar Dey. This Women's self-help group run by Kajla Janakalyan Samity is constantly figuring out financial support to increase the education fund. In current year 8 poor yet, meritorious students achieved monthly and yearly scholarship. In the academic year of 2021-2022, a total of 47,000 Rs, aid came for education from very ordinary families.

Collaboration with Govt. Schools:

Due to the lockdown, all schools in the state were closed, and the majority of students were getting

uninvolved in study. Though there was the ability for an online education system at the secondary and higher secondary level, the primary education system was very low. Kajla Janakalyan Samity conducted the regular basis programme called "education discussion meeting platform" with 15 primary schools for the betterment education, and the teaching process with the respected teachers

Networking & Advocacy:


Kajla Janakalyan Samity is associated with the "West Bengal Education Network" and "Right to Education Forum". In the current year, the organization and the above two networks have discussed various topics on the impact of Covid-19, and the importance of child nutrition, Child education.

Benashuli is a village located in the deep forest under the Nayagram block of Jhargram. The village is located in a very isolated area. 6 km from the main highway of the village. Most people belong to Lodha and Shabar communities. No importance on education among the parents here. They live by selling forest products. By the Educational support characterization in this village, Meetings are held to launch the center, but village people are mostly motivated by the meetings. So, the parents are being motivated with the help of responsible people and local people. Education support centers were started in primary schools there. After 1 month of home visiting and various meetings the children's attendance number was 46. The student's parents are not only getting inspired but also bringing more parents to evaluate their thinking. Except for education, there are some other activities like, nutrition gardening, nutrition food habits, other's meetings or assembly, personal health, and giving the knowledge of Govt. schemes. Some notable achievable matters are that the thought process has been changed, they are participating in many programmes, and they started believing in the power of education.



In the present year, KJKS has reached directly to 1130 children, 2000 adults and indirectly to 15000 people through the Child Protection programmes.

- ❖ 42 adolescent collectives have been made along with 1130 adolescents.
- ❖ 78 child marriage has been obstructed, with the help of local people and local Police at Purba Medinipur, Jhargram, South 24 Pargana.
- ❖ 5 children and women have been saved by the local child and women safety committee before the trafficking.
- ❖ In the joint initiative of Kajla Janakalyan Samity and Child Protection Committees, 4 children have come under the "Sponsorship" program under the Integrated Child Protection Scheme in East Medinipur District.
- ❖ In the current year, 6 children from 1 group of children of Bhajachauli village panchayat of East Midnipur district and 1 child from Mohanpur village panchayat of Magrahat-2nd block of South 24 Parganas district have been awarded "Veerangana" award for bravery by West Bengal (State Child Protection Commission).
- ❖ The West Bengal State Child Rights Protection Commission has recognized the Bhajachauli village panchayat of Kanthi-3 block in East Midnipur district for its exceptional performance in child protection.
- One Kanyashree was given to Dihikalash Gram Panchayat and one to Mohanpur Gram Panchayat in South 24 Parganas District for their special contribution to child protection.
- ❖ To form "Child-Friendly" villages in 5 blocks and to increase awareness among parents and kids, efforts have been made in the East Medinipur District to encourage Panchayat and block public representatives and officials to do so. Apart from this, local representatives of political parties have also been motivated.
- ❖ In the Nayagram block of the Jhargram district, 200 youngsters created "Unit For Us" throughout 18 parliaments. They saw the issues facing the community, took action to address them, and pushed the local government to do the same.
- ❖ The three Gram Panchayats in the work area have included child protection costs in their annual plans and have launched several campaigns to increase public awareness of the issue.



Like in past years, in 2021-2022, the Kajla Janakalyan Samity carried out the following programmes in the Purba Medinipur, South 24 Parganas, and Jhargram districts.

Children's Collective formation & Strengthen:

In Purba Medinipur, South 24 Parganas district, 42 village councils with children ages 13 to 18 have established 42 children's organizations. Members of children's organizations receive practical instruction on child protection over a 40-week module. Three kid clusters with child representatives who are capable of leadership have currently been established in three village panchayats. Children in the community collaborate with cluster officials to come up with ideas for child protection.



Strengthen of Child Protection Committee & CBOs:

42 village councils in Purba Medinipur and South 24 Parganas district were directly contacted with 42 child protection committees. 714 persons of various levels are associated with this committee in 42 village councils as per a well-integrated child protection scheme.

The committee meets every month as per government rules. On behalf of Kajla Janakalyan Samity, the members of this committee have been regularly trained in child protection. This organization always takes necessary actions to increase the empowerment of the committee. Local women self-reliant group members are composing



all information to local club members so that they could participate. Apart from this, intending to build a child-friendly village, the members of the youth and village-level child protection committee held face-to-face discussions with the officials of the three village panchayats of East Medinipur district.

Creating awareness of Child Protection issues:

To stop school dropout, child marriage, trafficking, and child labour, 138 awareness campaigns have

been launched with the help of the locals in 42 village councils in Purba Medinipur, South 24 Parganas district. In addition, Child Rights Day, Child Protection Day, and Prevention of Human Trafficking Day have been observed in Purba Medinipur, South 24 Parganas, Jhargram districts on initiative the of children's groups, self-help groups, and child protection



committees through rallies, discussion meetings, debate meetings, quiz competitions, drawing competitions, etc. 15000 persons have been made aware of this programme.

Advocacy with Police, Child Line, and Governmental Committees



Due to Covid-19, the rate of school dropping has taken a big number, and escape marriage has increased with the same flow. That's why women trafficking has raised very much. In case there is a matter happened of trafficking, the organization kept communication regularly with the local police station, block police administration, Childline, District Child protection unit, District Child welfare society, and State Child Rights Protection agencies. At present, 78 Child marriage, and 5 trafficking has been prevented in Purba Medinipur, Jhargram, and South 24 Pargana district.

Connecting Govt. Department with vulnerable families

The Duare Sarkar programme has been running in remote locations every year at the government of West Bengal's initiative. Workers from the Kajla Janakalyan Samity have been enrolled in this programme on behalf of the Block Administration and Gram Panchayat in the work area. 2500 eligible members of vulnerable families have been connected to government resources through this programme (Krishak Buddhi, Humanitarian, Food Companion, Health Companion, Shikashree, Kanyashree, Oikyasree, etc).



Rashiba Khatun, daughter of Amin Uddin Molla of Kalas village of Magrahat-2nd block of South 24 Parganas district, is a Class XI student of Kals High School. Rashiba Khatun, like other members of Children Collective of Uttar Kalas village, regularly participated in the sessions on child protection conducted in collaboration with Azim Premji Foundation. Now Rashiba is aware of the things that she learned from this session, besides being aware of the issues, she is sometimes doing rallies, sometimes street dramas, and sometimes postering to make the people of the village aware of the various problems related to child protection. More importantly, Rashiba is not stopping there as she is trying to teach other 14 to 18-year-old children in the village about the topics she has mastered from the sessions through two-hour sessions once a week so that more and more children in the village are aware of child protection issues. Become aware and make the village a child-friendly village in the future.





Tapoban Sishu Abas

The Kajla Janakalyan Samity to safeguard the safety of children with social and emotional disorders who lack care, protection, and education J.J. According to the Act, "Tapoban Shishu Abas" is a children's home. The Department of Women and Child Development and Social Welfare, Government of West Bengal, has approved and funded this refuge for children. The child is currently residing there throughout the year. 26 people live there.








The effects of the Maron deadly Coronavirus have been visible to everyone for the past two years; some people have lost their families or their jobs as a result. In addition, people of the large region of Purba Medinipur have experienced twin cyclones and floods during the past two years. The entire nation has also come to understand that although industries, mills, shops, markets, and markets have all been closed as a result of the corona, agricultural productivity has not been impacted. Yet, as a result of global warming, agriculture, and the environment are both in danger today. The agricultural system is now in a terrible state, with farmers unable to access everything from seeds to water. With the sincere efforts of a group of association employees, in the financial year 2021–2022 in 10 blocks of Purba Medinipur district and Nayagram block of Jhargram, one of the state's driest districts, direct offices and implemented various programmes on natural resource management with the goals of reducing global warming and expanding sustainable and environmentally friendly agriculture and agriculture-related livelihoods. the following-



A vegetable seedling production center has been established by ten members of the Maa Saraswati Women's group in Baksa village, Arra Gram Panchayat, Nayagram block, Jhargram district, to increase the availability of high-quality vegetable seedlings in the neighborhood during the current financial year. Eggplant, tomato, several types of chilies, papaya, gourds, pumpkin, and shrimp are all naturally produced at this production facility and supplied to the local farmers. Because of this, the Maa Saraswati team members, and respective farmers now have a source of income and can work longer hours while also providing farmers with high-quality seedlings. Last year, this team's initiative resulted in the production of 25,000 vegetable seedlings, and a total income was Rs. 22,000.



The maximum time of the last economic year was facing lockdown due to Covid-19. The working field of KJKS, Jhargram was under that as well. So the maximum number of people has lost their jobs, and 100 days of work progress has been slowed down. Not only the job issues, but the local people have also suffered the lack of food struggle due to this situation. Another problem about the Jhargram locality, there was no water irrigation system in that locality, so the farming process was very less and only once a year. To provide water, KJKS has built 3 cement irrigation systems between Bamdiha and Bamda village in Nawagram block under Arra Gram Pacnchayet. The benefit of these 22.05 hector farmland areas is getting 2 to 3 times crop plants per year. 65 farmers successfully farmed an extra 300 quintals (average) of rice. Villagers of these 2 villages took 930 days to make the water irrigation. This is a very proud thing for the villagers, that they are getting 2 to 3 times of agricultural benefits in 72 hector ground with the help of 7 check dams. 235 farmers are earning easily for their families. The profit has increased Rs. 24,000 per year.

As a result of the natural resource management in last 2021-2022 financial year growth happened like following-

With the initiative of 1650 farmers in the two districts, organic diversification in the area has been achieved through the proper management of natural resources and the quality agricultural production in the area has increased by 10-12 percent.

1650 farmers have become proficient about organic farming systems and are able to apply organic methods in their respective fields.

Organic farming is being done on 265 hectares of cultivable land in the two districts. The annual income from cultivation of 1650 farmers has increased by an average of Rs 2,000.

The devastation caused by the severe storm "Yash" that struck the coastal district of West Bengal and the ensuing floods occurred in most of the current financial year 2021–2022 when the entire world was battling the pandemic corona. The association has successfully carried out the following initiatives in these 2 districts with the help of consumer and worker friends at all levels to restore the balance of natural resources and guarantee people's livelihood.

The association regularly produces and supplies 20 tonnes of organic and biofertilizers from its laboratory, including Trichoderma VDT, Azotbacter, PSB, Trichosol, Azospirillum, and earthworm compost, to improve the availability of these materials in the region. Also, 200 packets of mushroom spawn and 20 liters of liquid Trichoderma VDT were made and distributed to nearby farmers.




Farmer Mr. Manos's Well-proportioned cultivation:

The Samity's work district, Purba Medinipur, saw the terrible storm "Yas" and the subsequent floods this year, which had a significant negative impact on agriculture and natural resources. Despite these disasters, the organization has assisted hundreds of farmers in carrying out their farming activities successfully. Manas Sheet of North Lakshi village in Khejuri-1 Block generates an additional 20,000Rs through his 46 decimal places well-coordinated farming system. His meticulous farming included home-raised fish in the pond, ducks, and a variety of plants and vegetables. did cattle both cow and fowl (Chicken). He has made his garden in the organic process, he utilized his cow's muck to make the vermicompost, and cow urine has been used for making Organic dissolution. Chicken litter has been used in the organic garden and for fish food. At present time Manas has become a well-known organic farmer. When he came back to thank the organization, informed them that many farmers are coming to him, and they gather all the important information about organic farming. They have started organic farming as well.

Ranu's Story: With the association over the past three years, Ranu Chand of Benamuri village in Kusumpur Gram Panchayat in Contai Block 3 has developed ideas on a variety of organic farming and keeping animals. The only wage earner in Ranu's family was her hard-working day laborer husband. She established a biological nutrient garden next to her home on three decimal places after joining the Parashmani team founded by Ranu Samiti, where she now plants an average of 10–12 varieties of vegetables throughout the year. Now she started selling those extra fresh vegetables, so her income has increased. She has 2 goats, and 10 chickens (flows), she has opened a new stationery shop, from the loan money of her group. She and her husband contribute their time to gardening, and she looks after the estimation. She also notified that 5-6 women, from the village, has inspired by her work, and started doing the same. In the total amount, Ranu is 9+proudly earning extra Rs. 20,000-22,000 in a year.



From the beginning of Kajla Janakalyan Samity started the health programmes in several regions, there were unlimited fields, where the organization improvised the health department, Governmental health structure. The main goal of the org. is to extend each benefit of Health-related information and details to needy people, so that deadly incidents like maternal death, infant mortality, and some other contagious disease can be erased from society.



In the financial year of 2021-2022, the org. has succussed to enhance capacity building, health-related awareness, and health services to 49213 (directly), and 298558 (indirectly) beneficiaries at east Midnapore, Jhargram, Howrah, and South 24 Parganas.




PAD BANK- Kajla Janakalyan Samiti has installed 18 pad banks in the Nayagram and Gopiballabhpur-1 blocks of the Jhargram district to raise menstrual girls' and women's knowledge of their health and encourage the growth of science-based habits. Members of the Pad Bank regularly arrange seminars to educate people about good hygienic practices and to persuade them to wear pads while menstruating. Presently, 1400 teenage girls and women are involved with these pad banks and are managing them independently.








Many Governmental and non-governmental organizations are working very hard to increase the Sustainable Development Goal (no.5) for gender equality throughout the world. Women empowerment is part of it, though the level from individual families in extreme villages and cities are not allowed to share any opinion for the betterment. A group of excellent staff came forward to uproot the situation. The economic year conducted self-independent groups with 15,000 women in the social, political, and financial empowerment fields. The programme has been organized in several areas- 6 blocks at Purba Medinipur, 2 blocks at Jhargram, 1 block at South 24 Pargana, and 2 municipality wards at Howrah. In these 4 districts, there were many campaigns and programmes operated to remove gender discrimination and to raise women's empowerment. The development showed a great result in 2021-2022.



With the help of her Mumtaz Self-Help Group and KJKS, Asema Bibi of Betalia village in Purba Medinipur district has been able to increase her savings in her own name and purchase 10 Katha of land. She currently earns an average monthly income of Rs 5000 through her vegetable and fish business. She built a shoe store for her son, it is said.

- ➤ Zion Marshal of Kendugari Village Panchayat in the Jhargram District's Chaulbata Village She established her own investment goals with the assistance of the Women Self-reliant group, opened a grocery business, and now she is earning 6000 Rs, and with the money, she is financially supporting her family.
- ➤ 120 women in the area have an Aadhar card, a health partner, a Lakshmi Bhandar, and a bank account with T.B patients, The patient will get regular meals by the arrangements Thanks to the initiative of Rakask, Milon and Sahara women Cluster Samiti in Ward No. 19 and 20 in the Howrah Municipality area of the Howrah district.






- ➤ 1320 self-help groups with 15000 members have been founded as of this year in 83 cluster-level associations in the East Medinipur district, 2 cluster-level organizations in the Howrah district, and 1 cluster-level association in the Jhargram district.
- ➤ Many portions of the Purba Medinipur district experienced the destructive storm Yash and spate in 2021–2022 in addition to the Corona epidemic. While the majority of people were attempting to protect themselves from the storm and flooding, 60 families, including children, women, elderly persons, and animals, were saved thanks to the initiative of Sagardisha and Sagarkanya Guch Samiti of Biramput village in Majilapur Gram Panchayat of Contai-I Block. They were then relocated to the Summit and the nearby village in a safe location. They have been able to give them access to food, water, and nutrition with the Gram Panchayat.



Some positive effects of Women empowerment programmes


- 90% of the population understands the negative effects of child marriage and can help prevent it.
- 75% of the participants are making an average monthly income of Rs. 1500 on their own.
- 45% of women are supporting miserable family children for health and education.
- 91% of women in the group have created an emergency fund, and that helped 6595 women in a critical situation.
- 65% of women are moving forward to leading talent, financial management, organic cultivation, and multiple benefits of govt. schemes.
- 219 new women independent women have been operated on.
- 1500 women from 151 groups are willing and positively getting success to fulfil their aims for the economic, social, and cultural development of women.



Disaster-prone areas include vast portions of the North and South 24 Parganas districts, Purba and Pashchim Medinipur, Jhargram, and West Bengal's coastal districts. Many families still don't have access to disaster-resistant housing. Children, women who are expecting or nursing, the elderly, and persons with special needs also struggle to get the right nourishment, food, and protection during disasters. In addition, there has been a corona pandemic breakout in our nation and over the globe since 2020. As a result, many people passed away too soon.

To lower the danger of natural disasters, Kajla Janakalyan Samity has been collaborating with numerous national and international organizations as well as government ministries. This program's major goal is to reduce risk, damage, and fatality rates in disaster-prone areas by implementing disaster management activities. Together with maintaining good hygiene practices and making efforts to stop the Corona pandemic from spreading.

- The Kajla Janakalyan Samity constructed the child-centered flood-stricken shelter, not
 only for a disaster-suffering community but for the community development facility as
 well. Including an educational support center and a library.
- The distribution of food items, triplets, and hygiene kits to 21120 families in the Purba Medinipur, Jhargram, Howrah and South 24 Parganas, Pashchim Medinipur, North 24 Parganas, and Murshidabad districts affected by the Yas and Coronavirus and flood outbreak is part of Kajla Janakalyan Samity's moral duty to stand by those who are suffering from calamities.
- 86050 persons who were impacted by the corona outbreak and were made homeless by the flood, have been served cooked food by the org.
- In the name of fighting Covid-19, 3600 ASHA employees and ANMs have received thermal guns, pulse oximeters, and other medical gear as well as training.
- Green forces on disaster management and climate change have created and trained 885 youth in the districts of South 24 Parganas and East Medinipur.
- Tablo has conducted a campaign in 833 villages and 149 schools of 45 Gram Panchayats in 6 blocks of the Purba Medinipur, Jhargram, and South 24 Parganas districts to raise community awareness of Covid-19. 534943 locals and 92796 students have benefited as a result.





- To stop river embankment damage, 10,000 mangrove plants have been planted in the Gopalnagar village panchayat of the Patharpratima block of the South 24 Parganas district.
- 2000 Guava, Jamrul plants were planted in 8 schools, and 6000 Arjuna and Jamkul seedlings were put alongside the road.

Corona epidemic anxiety has had a significant impact on public life. After losing their employment,



migrant labourers went back home. The majority of them chose not to go back to work after Corona's effects decreased. Also, young rural families that were at risk for danger faced a variety of threats as a result of the lack of income. Girls that are from families weaker escaping from their houses. To address this issue, Kajla Janakalyan Samity joined forces with the "Azeem Premii Foundation" and launched

the "Personal Income Initiative Program" as part of the Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme in the 7 Gram Panchayat Areas of Magrahat 2 and Patharpratima Block of South 24 Parganas. The administration of the South 24 Parganas district, each development officer of the Magrahat-2 and Patharpratima blocks, as well as the members of the MGNREGS cell and the heads and representatives of the village panchayats, extended their support of cooperation for the implementation.

Rupsa Nasrin, 14, is the only daughter of Nazim Hossain Molla. Through the efforts of the Magrahat-II block administration and Dihikalash Gram Panchayat to increase the family income, his family was included in the personal income initiative programme under the Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme to prevent his early marriage and to regularize her education. 65 working days have been established, and gardens have been planted. Nazim Hossain Molla's family received Rs. 13,845 through the Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme and Rs. 10,650 through the Personal Income Initiative Program in the financial year 2021–2022. The family's financial situation has changed as a result of being included in the government programme. Now that Rupsa Nasrin is attending school regularly, the family is living happily.



Gopal Seth, a resident of Banshyamnagar village panchayat in Patharpratima block, has tried to enhance his family's income by enrolling in the personal income initiative programme under the Mahatma Gandhi Rural Employment Guarantee. His employment card number is OB-16-027-002-008/651. He has given his family 6390 rupees through effectively managed ponds, and he has received 15975 rupees via job card for putting in 75 working days this year. The family of Gopal Seth is delighted to profit from the government programme.

Green Scout:

Many factors are destroying nature's delicate balance. What was previously seen in the immediate area is no longer visible. In addition to using more fossil fuels, more and more trees are being cut down. The use of very soluble substances has also increased. The weather is shifting. Biodiversity is



being impacted by global warming.

For their benefit alone, humans are indiscriminately oppressing the natural world. Change is necessary. Being a social work organization, Janakalyan Samity believes that if adolescents become conscious and alter their everyday lives, this problem may be changed. As a result, the Kajla Janakalyan Samity

formed "Green Scout" in villages with teenagers between the ages of 14 - 20 to raise environmental consciousness and alter people's daily lives.

Formation of "Green Scout" is an initiative to promote alternative environmental awareness among youth (aged 14 to 20) and to raise their environmental awareness of nature and the environment. Teenagers are being educated about environmental awareness through weekly sessions under the direction of Kajla Janakalyan Samity and in partnership with UNICEF and CRY in the Ramnagar-I and Contai-I blocks of Purba Medinipur district and the Magrahat-II and Patharpratima block of South 24 Parganas district.

15-year-old The Green Force is comprised of Soumyadeep Bhuiyan, a resident of Mahendranagar village in the Gopalnagar Gram panchayat of the Patharpratima block of the South 24 Parganas district and the son of Sukhendu Bhuiyan. He had always been deeply committed to preserving the environment. In textbooks, he has read about the drawbacks of carrying plastic bags. Yet nobody in the community concurs. He is now joined by 14 other children who have studied the negative impacts of plastic. His boldness has grown since then. Members of Green Scouts have begun to persuade residents under his direction. As a result, he is successful in persuading her parents at home that using plastic might be harmful to the environment and even to one's health. Vegetables, fish, and meat are not delivered in plastic bags from the market to Soumyadeep's home instead of meals. His family makes an effort not to use plastic.

Mission Covid vaccination

The epidemic Coronavirus has extended, all over the world Since 2020. Many people have died due to this. Indian scientist has successfully lightened up our positive hope to us, by inventing the anti-Covid vaccine.



Kajla Janakalyan Samity is not only working on the prevalence the awareness of Covid-19 but they are trying to convince (by campaigning) people to make them understand that there is no harm to get the vaccination. In this mission, CRY is helping greatly. With the assistance of motivators, people are getting motivated to get the vaccination at vaccination centers (6 districts, 11 blocks, 10 wards). It is very great that with the motivators and the block administration officers have succeeded to vaccinate 50583 adults in 1st doze, 34441 adults in 2nd doze, and 606 children.

Jahanara Bewa of South 24 Parganas District's Magrahat-2nd Block, Mohanpur Gram Panchayat, and Dihinarayani Village. She has specific needs and is an elderly woman. He has two sons at home. To prevent the corona epidemic, the government is taking a massive vaccination initiative. Kajla Janakalyan Samiti is also involved in this campaign by making people aware. Although many people took the vaccine, Jahanara Bewa did not want to take the covid vaccine. When the health workers requested him to take the vaccine, she used to say that taking this vaccine could cause breathing difficulties and even death.

She agreed to receive the covid vaccine because she recognized the value of vaccinations. Kajla Janakalyan Samity officially entered her house and made an effort to persuade for the vaccination. After that, because she is a very old woman, it was physically impossible for her to go to the vaccination center on her own, so the organization took the responsibility to drive her to the vaccination facility. On September 21, 2021, she finally took the first dose of CoviShield, and 84 days later, on December 15, 2021, she took the second dose. She had no issues after taking two doses of the CoviShield vaccine. She convinced her neighbors and others who were hesitant to be immunized to do so.

Use of Flood Shelter: Three Child Centred Flood Shelters are located in three Gram



panchayats in Bhagbanpur-II, Patashpur-I, and II Blocks, by the initiative of Kajla Janakalyan Samity and in collaboration with Save the Children. Today's Pusha "Dishari" shelters are located near the area's irregular and educationally behindhand schools. A few genius-educated local teenagers who are unemployed run this coaching center, which provides reading services to about 190 kids. Moreover, locals run a library at the

Bamunda "Sonartari" Flood Shelter, which is geared toward children.

Networking & Advocacy:

In the current year, there was a zoom call meeting organized by the District AIG Platform with 30 NGO representatives and district disaster management administrative. The subject of the meeting was the protocols for during and after-disaster coping situations. Apart from that 15-disaster management preparation meeting was arranged by State AIG of West Bengal, where Kajla Janakalyan Samity not only presented but participated equally, gathered the necessary information, and shared their opinion.

- Kajla Janakalyan Samity has been selected as the convener for coordination among representatives of all NGOs affiliated to district IAG in Purba Medinipur district.
- Kajla Janakalyan Samity is being used as a resource organisation on disaster management in Purba Medinipur district.
- Kajla Janakalyan Samity has participated in the plan to reduce the risk of block-based disasters.

Tajpur is one of the weakest parliaments under Talgachari Gram Panchayat of Ramnagar-I block of Purba Medinipur district. Located near the Bay of Bengal, most of the people of this village live in mud and semi-pucca houses.

Amina Bibi resides in this community. They settle in a fish farm region by the sea in a mud house with their five family members. Her house's asbestos roof was demolished by Cyclone Yash, leaving the family homeless. Also, there is no revenue because of the coronavirus outbreak this year. Raising a family in challenging circumstances requires effort. UNICEF and Kajla Janakalyan Samity supported their families at that time. Her family received shelter kits, food, and medical supplies. She repairs her house with a shelter kit.



36 families who depended on tube wells and some families who relied on faraway tube wells for drinking water faced hardship on 24/05/2020, as a result of the impact of devastating Cyclone Yas on the deep tube wells of Manakaraiput Sansad of Majilapur Gram Panchayat in Contai-I Block of Purba Medinipur District. After consuming untreated water, other people have started various ailments. In this case, Kajla Janakalyan Samity, UNICEF, and the local Gram Panchayat worked together to rebuild the deep tubewell. For the convenience of the villagers, a 1000-liter water drum has been constructed to hold the water, that is going to be pumped into it. Currently, 35 to 36 families use tube wells to collect and get pure drinking water.

Several community developments projects:

Since its foundation, Kajla Janakalyan Samity has undertaken some efforts for local and neighborhood improvement while preserving both its own and the village's cultures. The national level organization

"Goonj" is accelerating these measures even more. In the working areas of Jhargram and Purba Medinipur districts, Kajla Janakalyan Samity and "Goonj," a collaborative initiative of residents for village development, elimination of the problem of menstruation girls, and unmotivated school-going youngsters, have implemented several innovative programmes. catches people's attraction, in exchange for the



job completed in this programme, participants receive clothing and other essential supplies.

Goat farm of Self-Help-Group:

Pathrasol is a forest-based community located in the Nayagram block of the Jhargram district. A self-help group called "Kunami" was established in 2014 with 12 members. Every member contributes



100Rs every month to their savings. The Self-Help Group has been making significant progress since the beginning, but since 2019, financial issues have arisen as a result of COVID-19 and attacks by forest elephants. During the Covid period, they were helplessly forced to return home after working as migratory labourers, their family members are still without and unable to non-timber gather forest resources. Elephant attacks also seriously harm the growth of vegetables and paddy.

Kajla Janakalyan Samity is deliberately and constantly

working on women's empowerment by securing their livelihoods. They had discussed their problem with KJKS. In this situation, KJKS has advised the Self-reliant group about goat farming. Raising goats is something Kajla Janakalyan Samity advises doing in their self-help groups. After then, the "Comprehensive Area Development Consortium"-Debra Unit and "Goonj"-Kolkata were called by Kajla Janakalyan Samity to carry out the initiative. Then, "Goonj"-Kolkata donated Rs. 70,000 to build a goat farm, and "Comprehensive Area Development Consortium"-Debra Unit arranged to train 19 goats and members. Self-help group women invested 30,000 from their money and began work in August 2021. Currently, the farm has 25 goats, with a financial value of about Rs. 1,25,000. 4 goats were sold for Rs. 15,600. Each of them received 1300 rupees from the sale of the goats after the first year. They are now delighted to support their family.

Significant work and success-

- Six teak plantations and nine fruit plantations have been constructed in the Nayagram block of the Jhargram district, resulting in the creation of 996 working days.
- There are 2 bamboo poles created. The common residents of the two villages now have easier access to transportation, which is especially helpful for youngsters who need to get to school.
- Rural prosperity has been established in 38 villages and 775 families through the
 construction of roads, canal digging, check dams, village cleaning, grocery stores, goat
 farms, vermicompost pits, education support centers, pond rehabilitation, land
 leveling, seating, community baths, etc. There are 2325 working days in existence.
- 400 families were directly involved in the creation of 1200 work days in 14 villages across 6 blocks in the East Medinipur district through the use of nutrition gardens, vermicompost pits, Cat fish farming, herbal gardens, school gardens, school house repairs, road maintenance and cleaning, playground cleaning, etc. successful work has done.



Social Arbitration to Prevent and Control Domestic Violence-

Kajla Janakalyan Samity is working for 7 decades for the development and growth of backward families. Instead of that family violence is getting a big place in our society. Providing the right consultation and seeing equally to a man and women can make a healthy progressive society. So, the organization is constantly trying to control and deface the violence from the families. The organization has the authority and approval to control and reduce violence from families in the West Bengal Department of Social Welfare.

Financial Management and Analysis of current income and expenditure

The Kajla Janakalyan Samity has set up an accounts department with six experienced staff friends to manage income and expenditure with transparency. The economic transaction is done completely through the use of tally software by the computer. The employee friends of the accounts department work in coordination with the co-ordinators, supervisors and field workers in charge of the project and services.

The department of accounts is conducted depending on the following rules and principles, which are enshrined in the financial management policy of the organization.

- Rules for allocation of funds
- Payment rules
- Rules for advance payment
- Employee Welfare Rules
- The Bill and its Verification Rules
- Most of the transactions will be made through the bank and there will be no cash payment (there will be no cash payment without special reason)

Every month, the accounts statement based on the project and service is prepared by the department of accounts and sent to all the organizers, including the editor. Moreover, the secretary submits an account of income and expenditure to the director of the association every three months/six months. In addition, annual income and expenditure are presented at the general meeting every year. The general body appoints an auditor every year.


Any two of the President, Secretary, and Treasurer may sign bills and vouchers together and handle bank business. Also, field employees, supervisors, and coordinators first suggest that bills be paid, and then the accounting department's managers, who check that each bill complies with the rules, present the bills to the editor, president, and treasurer for approval before making payment arrangements.


According to Kajla Janakalyan Samity, achieving sustainability would be made possible by involving individuals for whom the activity is performed with resources like money, labour, and materials in its execution. Through the cooperation of people and organizations at different levels, the association has been able to raise donations this year, with the help of which it has carried out the majority of the work plans for the current year. In the past few days, the association received money, labour, materials, and opinions for the implementation of various programmes. Capable staffs of the organization's finance section effectively manage all donations received using automated computerized systems.

Donation Collection:

According to the association's annual financial audit for the financial year 2021–2022, the association received a total of Rs. 63745883 from different resource organizations, Rs. 3094340 from well-wishers of the organization, and a total of Rs. 12814886 from various consumers in the current year. The association also discovered that 68.70% of the total donations received this year came from different provinces in India and that 31.30% of those donations came from abroad, with 16% coming from the association's recipients at all levels. 


organization has observed that, for the convenience of consumers, administrative costs of programme implementation and costs of developing various types of resources in the workplace have acquired a specific place. The audit shows that 95.10% of the society's total expenditures for the current year went toward programme implementation, 4.05% towards administration, and 0.85% towards other forms of wealth development. According to the organization, the socioeconomic growth of regular people can be improved if administrative costs can be decreased and programme implementation costs can be raised.



Programme wise Expenditure:

In the current financial year, the society has invested a total of Rs. 174128106 for the implementation of 6 programmes, with the empowerment of women accounting for 66.5% of the total expenditure, education quality improvement accounting for 4.04% of the total expenditure, and livelihood improvement including agriculture accounting for 4.70%, and for disaster management accounting 18:6% of total expenditure. 
